Important People from Wyoming History by Etna 4th Graders

Buffalo Bill Cody by Wesley Whitmore

"My restless roaming spirit would not allow me to remain at home very long," says Buffalo Bill Cody. This quote from Cody explains how he could never stay in one spot for long because of his urge to explore. He had a rather interesting life, while having many occupations, and he had a negative and positive impact on wyoming.

William Frederick Cody was born on February 26, 1846. His mother was Mary Ann Bonsell Laycock. Isaac Cody was his father. He thought about going and getting a college degree at a university but decided to join the Pony Express. He got his name by killing almost 4,300 head of buffalo in 18 months. Cody married Louisa Frederici. They had five children. Two sons and three daughters. Unfortunately, Buffalo Bill Cody died January 10, 1907.

Buffalo Bill had many jobs. Cody served briefly in a civil war. He served 2 years the first time and 4 years the second. Cody is also known as his other nickname, The Showman Of The Wild West. This was because he became known as a legend. The news spread fast so he became a showman and started doing shows all around the world.

Around 1868, Calamity Jane had to take care of her siblings and at that time to make more money she was a cook, a dance hall girl, and a dishwasher. In 1874, she was a explorer, performer, army scout and an entertainer with Buffalo Bill Cody.

Do you know who Jedediah Smith was?

Jedediah Smith was a mountain man and a hunter. He had an interesting life, he had several occupations, and he had a positive impact on Wyoming.

Jedediah Strong Smith was born January 6, 1799 to Sally and Jedediah Smith. He was the sixth child out of fourteen children. He lived near Jericho, New York. He became a mountain man early and he probably left school when he was a teenager. Jedediah Strong Smith was never married or had kids. He died at an early age when he killed the Comanche chief. The Comanches were really mad and ran to Jedediah with spears and clubs and he was stabbed to death. Unfortunately, Smith died on May 27 in 1831 in a water hole on the Santa Fe Trail.

Jedediah Smith had several occupations. He was a fur trader, hunter, and mountain man. Smith hunted and traded fur. He fought against a bear and got most of his ear torn off of his head. Smith asked his partner, Jim Clyman, to get a needle and thread and sew up his wounds. He broke many ribs and bones fighting with the bear but he got better 10 days later. Then he got back to command the small group and kept his hair long to cover the scars on his head. Smith had his hair grow long and do a haircut where he moved his hair to the other side where the scars were.

Jedediah Strong Smith had a positive impact in Wyoming history. He was in South Pass, Wyoming when

he got attacked by a bear. The legend of the attack caused tourists to come to Wyoming. He explored and hunted in Wyoming. Jedediah made many trails some with other mountain men and others by himself. People even today use trails that he made. He left behind the legend of the bear attack when the bear threw him and the bear put most of its jaws around Jedediah Smith's head and got most of Jedediah's ear torn off.

As you can see, Jedediah Strong Smith had a interesting life, he had several occupations, and he had a positive Impact in Wyoming. "He re-discovered South Pass." "He was the first to enter California from the east." "He proved deserts could be crossed." "He crossed the Great Basin Desert and returned east from California." Jedediah Smith helped pioneers achieve the American dream.

The Amazing Kit Carson by Cara Andrews Do you know that Kit Carson's real name is Christopher Houston Carson? Kit Carson had a dangerous life, many occupations that helped people, and had a positive impact on Wyoming history. Kit was a amazing man with many occupations and a very emotional legacy.

Kit was born on the 24th of December 1809, in Kentucky. He was born to Rebecca and Lindsey Carson. Kit had 9 siblings and lived in a small log cabin. Their cabin was very small house with the ten kids sharing a loft and Kit's parent in their one room. Kit Carson went to grade school until his father died, then he dropped out. Later in his life, Kit married Waa-nibe (Arapaho Indian) and had one girl. After Waa-Nibe died, Kit married Making-Out-Rode (Cheyenne Indian) but later divorced. Kit married his 3rd wife, Maria Josefa Jaramillo 1828-1868. Josefa had nine kids, four girls and five boys. Unfortunately, Carson pass away on May 23, 1868 in Fort Lyon. He died of abdominal aortic aneurysms at the age of 58.


Kit worked as a Indian agent in Taos. He protected and watched over the Indians in his area. Kit was also a mountain man of the west. He trapped and hunted. He was a guide for John C. Frémont. He led him through the American West and frontier. And Kit was a American frontiers man.



























Etna students were awed by Garry Krinsky's "Toying with Science" presentation.
