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Eye health is as important as keeping our bodies healthy. It is recommended that children in their first year of life have a professional vision exam and then between the ages of 3 and 5 and annually after that.



Vision Screening was performed at the beginning of the school year. It is a very minimal screening and does NOT replace a

professional exam. Letters were sent home to all those that showed signs of needing a more in depth vision exam. If you received one of these letters, please have the optometrist fill it out and return it to the school. I have vouchers for those that do not have vision insurance that covers the eye exam and a pair of glasses if needed. Please contact me for any questions. If your student was enrolled after September 1st and you would like the nurse to do a vision screening, please e-mail me at skhamiltonholderman@lcsd2.org or call 307-885-7110.

In January, we will start a friendly classroom contest to encourage students who have prescription glasses to wear them. Please encourage your student to wear his/her glasses every day at school so they can be rewarded for consistently wearing their glasses.

Message from Dr. Jenning Voss, Optomotrist:

Poor vision can influence your ability to perform well at school. Bad eyesight can result in a reduced attention span or difficulty understanding printed material. Wearing glasses at school is very important for children who need them. Most kids who wear glasses need them to either see up close or far away. This can affect school work in many ways; seeing the blackboard, taking tests, reading, and even playing at recess. Children who have good glasses wearing habits will be more focused and able to make it through the school day without feeling strained. Good habits include: wearing your glasses when you're supposed to; keeping them in their case in a safe spot when not wearing them; and keeping your lenses clean for the best possible vision.

When Should Students Stay at Home?

A fever of 100 degrees F. or higher (using a fever reducer and then coming to school is not an acceptable practice).

Sudden onset of:

- 1. Diarrhea 2 or more episodes in 12 hours
- 2. Vomiting 2 or more episodes in 24 hours

A combination of two or more of the following:

Large lymph nodes, body aches, temperature over 100 F, chills, rash, sore throat, weakness, diarrhea, vomiting, or abdominal pain.

Any **bacterial infection** until treated for 24 hours.

Redness and Discharge in or around eye(s).
